DEFINITION OF DEMENTIA

We have found this brief definition helpful:

Dementia is a loss of brain function that occurs with certain diseases. Alzheimer's disease (AD) is one form of dementia that gradually gets worse over time. It affects memory, thinking and behaviour. Memory impairment, as well as problems with language, decision-making ability, judgment, and personality are necessary features for the diagnosis.
